

Reference values for defining suspected fever under different methods of measuring body temperature:

Mouth probe	37. 5 degrees 99. 5 degrees	
Ear probe	38.0 degrees 100.4 degrees	
Anal probe	38.0 degrees 100.4 degrees	
Armpit probe	37. 3 degrees	99. I degrees

Disease	Incubation Period (Days)	Recommended Sick Leave/Date of Return to School
Influenza	I <b>-</b> 3	Only those who have been medically certified as recovered or approved by the school may attend classes
Conjunctivitis (pink eye)	1-12	Medically cleared to attend school
Poliomyelitis	7-14	At least 14 days from the first sign of illness
Bacillary dysentery	1-7	Medically certified as recovered
Chickenpox	14-21	Until the scabs have fallen off or until medically certified
Cholera	1–5	Medically certified as recovered
Diphtheria	2-7	Medically certified as cured
Hand, foot and mouth disease	3-7	Medically certified as cured
Hepatitis A	15-20	I week from the first sign of jaundice as instructed by a doctor
Measles	7-18	4 days from the onset of the rash
Meningococcal infection (invasive)	2-10	Medically certified as recovered
Mumps	12-25	9 days from the onset of swelling
German measles	14-23	7 days from the onset of rash
Scarlet fever	1-3	5 days from the date of taking antibiotics or being medically cleared to attend school
Tuberculosis	Indeterninate	Medically cleared to attend school
Typhoid	7-21	Medically cleared to attend school
Viral gastroenteritis	1-10	Until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea or vomiting
Whooping cough	7-10	Until at least 5 days of antibiotic treatment has been completed or as instructed by a doctor
Head lice	2-20	Until all head lice have been removed and the school has checked and approved
